











# Dear Parents / Carers and Students,

Welcome to the first newsletter of the 2021/22 academic year. It has been great to have our students back in school and back to "normal" without the use of any year group

bubbles. I hope our Year 7 students have enjoyed the first few terms of their secondary school journey.

It has been wonderful for our students to, once again, experience the full curriculum including all practical and vocational learning as well as academic.

We were able to hold two great community events towards the start of the year; our Community Breakfast on Saturday 16 October and our Remembrance Tree Planting Service on Saturday 13 November. It was lovely to have so many members of the community attend these events. We had lots of children from local primary schools attend the Community Breakfast event with their families — we hope to see them join the PCSA family over the next few years!

We had planned to hold a further two events prior to the Christmas break; the PCSA Christmas Fayre and our Awards Evening. Unfortunately, as previously communicated, we had to make the decision to cancel these events in light of the current situation with COVID-19 and the rise in case numbers. However, these events will still go ahead in 2022! We will be moving the fayre to April and renaming it the PCSA Easter Fayre — we look forward to seeing you all there. I want to thank the small and local businesses, who were involved, for their support and understanding. Similarly, our Awards Evening will be postponed to Term 3. We will share details for this event closer to the time.

You will have recently received a letter which lays out the plans for the start of Term 3 in regards to COVID-19 testing. On 26 November 2021, the government made a statement that in January every secondary school in England will have access to rapid COVID-19 testing. As before, the testing is optional and only those for whom we have consent can receive the test. Please ensure that you are familiar with the information in the letter as it provides details on the phased return for students.

On the topic of COVID-19 testing, the lateral flow test kits have proved useful in identifying COVID-19 asymptomatic cases. We will continue to issues these test kits, so please contact us if you require a kit. We ask that your child continues to test twice weekly during the Christmas break and following the on-site test in January. Please also continue to record your test results using the links found on our website.

We have recently put in place another additional safety measure by placing a CO2 monitor across our classrooms. This will ensure that there is enough ventilation through the rooms at all times. In terms of ventilation, we appreciate during the winter months some areas can get colder. Students are able to wear their coats where it is safe to do so.

Furthermore, we are always happy to help and support at any point. If you need to come into the school, please do contact us prior to coming to ensure the member of staff you wish to speak to is available. Contact details for all members of staff are also available on our website.

At this point, I would like to thank our parents/carers and students for the ongoing support and understanding. Also, a huge thank you to my colleagues at PCSA who, as always, go above and beyond to give our students a safe learning environment to thrive to the best of their ability.

# **CEO'S Message**





























The first two terms of the school year have really flown by - it seems it was only yesterday when we returned from the two-week October break; because of this system and as you will know there will be no more 'one-off' INSET days this year across our Trust.

To keep up with all our news please do follow our schools on Twitter – we have lots of 'news and views' on Twitter and we also have our excellent website https://goodnewspost.co.uk/. Here you will find all the great things we have been involved with from September to December; such as visiting COP26, our Remembrance Day activities and the Sovereign Centre Art Exhibition – see image on the right. Please do have a look – we have been very busy.

We have been moving forward quickly with more site development thinking - for example, we have planned our 'Appropriate Provision Centres' (APCs) which will hopefully be in place for September 2022. These two new centres will meet the needs of more of our learners in a more appropriate way - behaviourally, socially and emotionally. We are also working on plans to relocate the Priory Pre-School (currently at PCSA) to our Castle Batch site. This will be branded as 'Little Learners @Castle Batch' and will be set up in the same way as our current provision. We are very fortunate to be in a really strong financial position to make all these projects happen; our end of year accounts showed again some very healthy reserves. All our reserves are now 'pooled' centrally to allow these bigger projects to happen more easily. Great work by our central finance team and especially by our Chief Operations Officer - Mark Antoine.

Our main aim into 2022 will be to again relentlessly focus on excellent classroom practice across all our schools - sometimes called 'quality first teaching'. This is the main route for our children in 'catching up' for any lost learning - effective teaching and effective feedback in classrooms has always been the key to educational success. Mr. Jenkins (Head of School Improvement) and Mrs. Dadds (Deputy Head of School Improvement) are continuing to work very closely with all our Principals to drive our schools forward – even with, and despite the pandemic. You might not be aware, but we have three excellent 'Directors of Subject' – Mrs. Sharon Goddard-Lock (Maths), Mrs. Louise Daniels



(Science) and Mr. Tom Walker (English) – these superb colleagues work across all our TPLT schools on curriculum development and assessment. They also coach our subject leaders and get involved in coaching great classroom practice. In recent times they have also been directly teaching within our schools. We also have a brilliant central Director of Careers in Mr. James Wilmot; we are very passionate in the view that effective careers education is a right for all students across TPLT. Careers Education is a real strength of TPLT. So, we have a really strong team of school improvement professionals working alongside our school leaders.

Some people news; in Term 1 we were delighted to appoint Mr. Dan Milford as the substantive and permanent Principal at TKASA. Dan has previously worked with us at WCSA and will continue the great work at TKASA into the future. He has recently been our Acting Principal at TKASA. Lastly, and on a personal note I will be moving on from TPLT at the end of March 2022 after around 20 years working in W-s-M at PCS, PCSA and latterly as CEO of TPLT. Our Trust Board (Governing Body led by our Chair Katie Dominy) will be taking the lead and appointing a new CEO in due course; it will be an exciting time for all. This will clearly bring another perspective that I am sure will take TPLT into the next stage of its development. The future is very, very bright. I end by noting we have already recruited another 28 colleagues to 'train to teach' within our Trust next year. We are very much a 'doing' Trust – many of these great new colleagues will stay with us and then teach our children in North Somerset and Somerset. Please have a great Christmas break and once again – thank you for all your super support.


### **GCSE PHOTOGRAPHY Year 11**

We have been delighted with the outcomes that have started to develop.






The Art Department continues to promote diversity and equality in the curriculum. We have already covered British Values, the BLM movement and the LGBTQ+ community.



# **ENGLISH**





As you can see below from our KS3 and KS4 news, we've had a busy and purposeful start to our year here in the English faculty. I've been very impressed with the work ethic that Year 10 are displaying, as they really get to grips with their first taste of GCSE level literature. We've seen some fantastic responses to A Christmas Carol, which show that they have really understood the text and the messages behind it. We have been equally impressed by Year 11's PPE responses about Romeo and Juliet, which were the strongest we've ever had at this point in the year.

Most of KS3 have started the year getting their teeth stuck into some Shakespeare and have risen to the challenge. I'm passionate about giving all of our students as many chances as possible to experience the greatest English playwright, which is why we study one of his plays a year in KS3. Hopefully the students will enjoy moving on from this and onto more modern texts (and doing their own writing) as the year progresses.

Finally, we welcomed Miss Wray back from her maternity leave at the beginning of term 2 and she has really hit the ground running. She is an excellent addition to the team and I hope that her classes are enjoying her enthusiasm and expertise in their lessons.





### KS3 English

KS3 have all been focusing on new Cycles of learning. Either The Tempest, Much Ado About Nothing or they have been busy exploring the classics. We have focused a lot of energy and attention on their writing skills with a scheme we are calling, Just Write. This new focus on writing is in response to feedback we regularly get from students and parents that they wished there were more chances to write in our lessons. Just Write gives students a whole lesson to 'Just Write', practising their writing techniques that will have been taught and discussed in lesson one and the lesson beforehand.

This is still a work in progress but the feedback that we have had from parents, students and staff members

makes us feel that 'Just Write' is being enjoyed and the students are gaining in both writing stamina and upgrading their writing skills each time. **Year 7** have been looking at autobiographical writing as their Cycle Two focus, looking at examples from figures as diverse as David Walliams, Nadia Hussain and Marcus Rashford. Next, we practise writing our own sections in the Just Write lesson – teachers too! We have seen some wonderful examples of writing already, and are looking forward to reading the final pieces at the end of the cycle.

**Year 8** have been learning about how Shakespeare uses language to convey meaning. We have examined the Shakespearean play Much Ado About Nothing and considered how Shakespeare uses various literary devices to show details about each character in a 'Show Don't Tell' way — an important skill the students need to develop for preparation for future success in KS4.


Finally, Year 9 have been exploring the classics. Collectively we entered the world of Zeus, Hera and Hades! We examined many forms of storytelling: playwriting, audio stories, short stories and the novel. We then crafted many superb Just Writes that retold the legends of Hera, Hades and Pandora. What a gift.

### KS4 English

KS4 students have thrown themselves back in to their studies since they have returned in September. We have been so impressed with their determination and dedication. In these strange times, all that we can control is our attitude.

Our Year 11s have risen to their first challenge of the year and sat their PPEs in November on Creative Writing and Romeo and Juliet. We are really pleased with how they have responded to this challenge and it has helped them set their revision targets for the coming months as we move our focus to A Christmas Carol. Year 11s have also been busily preparing their speeches for their Speaking and Listening presentations on a topic that interests them. So many interesting topics covered this year, from wage equality in sport to whether electric cars are the future of transport. Public speaking is such a vital skill for our students to build confidence in.

In Year 10, we have been reading Dicken's A Christmas Carol charting Scrooge's road to redemption. We are totally ready to embrace the magic of Christmas: no more "Bah humbug!" this year.

Before joining PCSA, I completed my PGCE at Exeter University where I had also studied for my undergraduate in Economics. I have aspired to be a teacher since leaving school. Primarily for the

difference that can be made to students lives as well as the joy that learning in the classroom can bring. It was the great teachers during my time at school that inspired in me a love of learning that I have since sought to pass on to my students.



### Azmi Yafi

I have worked in Marketing Communication in a wide variety of posts for a number of years in many international markets before returning permanently to the UK and decided to embark

on a career in education. I completed my Secondary Maths PGCE at the University of Gloucestershire. Working in industry made me realise the untapped potential of young people going into business who were lacking a strong grounding in mathematics, and as a result had a slower career progression. Apart from the pleasure I get from teaching maths, I wanted to give back to the community and promote the love of mathematics in young minds and demonstrate to them that maths touches every single part of their life.

### **Home Learning**

A little bit about how home learning has changed in maths. All year groups now hand their home learning in on the same day; Monday is Year 9, Tuesday is Year 7 and 8, Wednesday is Year 10 and Thursday is Year 11.

We are also increasing the use of Hegarty Maths across all the year groups. In Year 7 and 8 there is a minimum of one task per week and in Year 9, 10 and 11 it is a minimum of two tasks per week. Your child is expected to aim for 100% otherwise they will need to watch the video again and have ONE more go. If they struggle or have any problems make sure they talk to their teacher who will be happy to help. These tasks are set by your teacher on a weekly basis and relate to the topics they are learning in the classroom. The benefit here is that tasks can be set on an individual basis making the homework more tailored to the needs of the individual.

In addition, Year 9s will also work through one Method maths paper per cycle, Year 10s two per cycle and Year 11s three per

cycle. These are all past papers and the software marks the papers and provides helpful hints and tips. Students are not expected to answer all the questions but have a go at as many as they can.

### **Enrichment opportunities**

As well as help with home learning we are also running termly enrichment challenges. This term we have been recreating the school in miniature. For our KS3 students this has involved measuring out the whole school and then scaling this down into a diagram. Once the blue print had been created it was then created in a 3D scale model. This has involved many cardboard boxes, news paper and paint. Here are just some of the pictures of the progress made. Finished results will be shown in the next newsletter.

For KS4 we also did the same project, but with a twist. The students still went out with their measures and measured the school and created a scale diagram, but this time we are going to print a 3D scale model using the 3D printer. We are hoping that we can display these around the school for all to see one of the many applications of mathematics. If your child is interested in these events they are on Tuesday for KS4 and Wednesday for KS3, just head over to the maths faculty.

# **HUMANITIES**





**In RE**, Year 7 and 8 have been studying Judaism and Hinduism respectively. Below are some examples of the work they have produced this term.




Year 8 History – The History of the Slave Trade




Year 9 History - Timeline of the Nuremburg Laws






### **Open Evening**




Year 11 Sociology - Revision notes




Year 11 Geography - Hazards revision notes












# **COMPUTER SCIENCE, ICT & BUSINESS**



### Computer Systems - Year 7

After starting Year 7 by learning all about E-Safety, our Year 7 groups have progressed in cycle 2 to studying computer systems.



In this unit, students find out all about computer components and their functions as well as gaining an understanding about input and output peripherals for computers. They are shortly moving on to look at how computer systems can be embedded into everyday household appliances, including the concept of 'The Internet of Things' where even a fridge freezer can communicate with its owner online.




### Year 8 - Thunkable (App Development)

Year 8 were very excited to start their new year at Priory by having access for the first time to our computer suites for their computing & ICT lessons. They are currently working through an app development unit where they use the 'Thunkable' platform to create their own app using block programming techniques. They have learned the principles of good app design as well as how to format their different app screens. On the programming side, they have added images, navigation, and sounds as well as learning how to add loading screens and different app modules such as 'Text to Speech', 'Translator' and 'Image Recognition'.

### Interactive PowerPoint Quiz - Year 9

Having had a year away from being in computer rooms, Year 9 students were keen to return to the computer rooms and started their Year 9 learning journey by working through a Python programming project. They have now moved on to learning to use PowerPoint to create an interactive multimedia quiz based on a topic of their choice. In this unit, students have been adding hyperlinks, videos and sounds to their question slides to make their quizzes work in an interactive way.




### Year 10 & 11 P6 Activities

# LANGUAGES & GLOBAL UNDERSTANDING (LGU)



What a busy term it has been and how much we have enjoyed being back in specialist classrooms and back to our usual routines! Our students have had a fantastic start to the new school year – well done to all!

Year 7 have very quickly got to grips with our Learning Cycles and learning their words weekly and it was wonderful to see their achievements in their first ever assessment week — well done everyone!



They also have, along with all other year groups, embraced online home learning, learning vocabulary using Memrise. This is a fantastic way of learning the words and we are seeing the benefits already. Students can keep track of their points and there has been some good interclass competition!

From Learning Cycle 2, students will consolidate their learning with a final Google quiz to be completed once they have learnt their words. This is excellent preparation for the weekly vocabulary test. We are so proud of our students' efforts to learn and recall key vocabulary and it is always so rewarding so see the progress students make in their learning when they put in the effort into remembering vocabulary.



### **NEWS FROM THE SRB**

Hello! As always we have had an incredibly busy few months in the SRB (Sir Richard Branson Centre). In September we welcomed our brilliant new Year 7s and quickly screened them to check if they would need some support in lessons. Since then we have been testing to see if our Year 10 and 11 students are eligible for exam concessions. If you have any concerns at all about any student's ability to access the lessons or exams please contact Miss Smith.

In Year 7 some of our students have started phonics intervention. This uses Fresh Start from Read Write Inc. Ollie said "Phonics have really helped me as my spelling is so much better. It makes my other lessons easier".

In Year 8 intervention they have just finished reading Fantastic Mr Fox which they all enjoyed, and are now moving onto a Sheep Pig, this is a new and interesting one for them as they have not seen or heard of the book. We have been enjoying using a mixture of writing in our books, as well as using computers to complete our work. Once a week we are still working on our phonics books so that we can improve our sounds, spelling and understanding. We are also having fun doing culture starters. Last cycle, to go in line with Fantastic Mr Fox, we focused on finding out different characters



(fox, badger, rat, rabbit and farmer) and foods that the farmers ate (chicken, ducks, apples, doughnuts) in French, Spanish, German and Italian. We also have some Year 8s that have extra maths support so we have been looking at fractions and algebra.

A favourite activity for the students was pretending that Mr Markoutsas had asked them to create a mindfulness garden for the students' mental health. They were given grid paper to draw up a plan. They then needed to work out what fraction of the garden was dedicated to what. Charlie decided she wanted a big dolphin water feature in her garden which was 4/36 of her whole plan.

- To assist the decision making of the Principal and Academy Leadership team in pursuit of Trust and Academy objectives, ethos and strategy and to hold the Principal accountable for performance
- To ensure compliance with legislation, statutory regulations, Trust directives and Trust policies and identify and report on any risks to the Trust
- To act, on behalf of Trustees and with the Trust Executive and Principal, as proxy employer of staff working at the Academy in all matters delegated through the Scheme of Delegation.

# **LIBRARY**



As you can see from the photo above, Victor, Issac and Alfie were very quickly engrossed in their books and at breaktimes the library is full of students reading.







Every English group throughout Years 7 to 11 have had a library lesson and induction during terms 1 and 2 to give them the opportunity to see what the library has to offer. All students have been encouraged to borrow books and our KS4 students have taken full advantage of our "Young Adult" section with books that are a little more mature in content. To date we have loaned out 965 books and as we are placing new fiction and non-fiction books on our shelves all the time that number will steadily rise as we progress through the academic year.

Every year we enrol onto the BookBuzz program where every student in Year 7 is able to choose a free book for themselves from a fantastic array of titles made available



through Book Trust. However, this year for the first year ever we have extended this program to our Year 8s too. All Year 7s and 8s have chosen their books and when they arrive in school students will be invited into the library to collect them. There were 17 titles to choose from this year and there was a tie for first place for the most popular choice. There were 81 requests for both 'The Haunting of Aveline Jones' and 'Rat' and 53 requests for 'D-Day Dog'. 'Wonderscape' was close behind with 49 requests. We really hope they enjoy reading their





books and every title will be available from the library should they wish to read some of the other titles too.

# **UNIFORM & MOBILE PHONES**





As with last academic year, we will continue with the policy of not allowing mobile devices (phones, watches, tablet devices) to be seen during the school day. This is in reaction to research showing students' usage of mobile technology having a directly detrimental effect on their health and well-being as well as on their academic progress. We have been incredibly pleased with the impact of this on the young people at PCSA and we thank both you and your children for their contribution to the success of this initiative. Seeing and hearing students talking to each other rather than being buried in their phones has, quite honestly, been a joy.

To once again clarify our stance, mobile devices (phones, watches and tablet devices) must be switched off and out of sight from the time students arrive on site in the morning until they leave the school at the end of the school day – this is inclusive of break and lunch time.

If you urgently need to contact your child during the school day please call the school on 01934 511411 and we will pass the message to them. If your child needs to contact home we will ask them to call from the reception at break or lunchtime, unless it is an emergency.

Should a mobile device be visible or clearly switched on (for example listening to music) then:

- in the first instance, the device will be confiscated by a member of staff and kept locked away in Student Services for collection after the final bell at 2.55pm.
- On the second occurrence of a phone being confiscated, it will require collection by a parent/carer after school at their next convenience. Should this be required, you will be informed by the school as soon as possible.

We continue to monitor the effect of mobile devices on student safety, wellbeing and academic progress and will continue to educate our community on safe and regulated usage. Support for parents/carers around digital wellbeing and managing mobile phone use is available from the UK Safer Internet Centre.


